Tasmania

Northern Tasmania

Surfrider Foundation Australia's North Tasmanian Branch expressed concern over recent statements made by Gunns Ltd Chief Executive Officer John Gay concerning the drinkability of potentially toxic effluent discharged by pulp mills. Gay publicly stated that on a recent tour of South American pulp mills he drank effluent discharged from those mills, finding it "drinkable." Gay's comments come at a sensitive time in the current Resource Planning and Development Commission (RPDC) review of a proposal by Gunns Ltd to construct a new pulp mill at Tamar in North Tasmania, and public submissions regarding this proposal. Surfrider Foundation Australia provided one such submission, outlining a 50 page scientific analysis to the RPDC on the potential health concerns for recreational users of the coast and requesting that these concerns be addressed in a formal, scientific manner.

Peter Whish-Wilson of Surfrider Foundation Australia North Tasmania said "These comments go against the spirit of the current Tamar Pulp Mill approval process, where submissions made to the RPDC should be meaningful and be based on sound scientific research. Mr. Gay's comments are simplistic and misleading and do not take into consideration the involuntary, extended exposure both to the public and the environment."
Whish-Wilson also commented "If the Gunns CEO believes the effluent is safe to drink, we recommend that he have medical scientists test this claim, and verify it with experienced pulp mill engineers before taking such a claim public. If this is found to be the case, I'm sure Tasmania could do with the extra 30 billion litres of drinking water per annum from the mills effluent discharge rather than having it dumped in the ocean." On the 2nd of January 2007 Simeon Michaels set out on his epic 2000 km paddle from Sydney to Hobart. Sim paddled to raise the profile of the purposed Gunns Pulp Mill to be located at Tamar Valley on Tasmania's North Coast.
Travelling South down the East Coast of NSW, passing stunning beaches and beautiful towns and hoping for great weather, Simeon Michaels paddled across the Victorian border to Wilson's Promontory. From there it's was a series of long and exposed paddles across Bass Strait, taking a right hand turn to Launceston on arriving at Tassie, then retracing steps (or strokes, as the case may be) across the top of Tassie, past the

spectacular Freycinet Peninsula, finally reaching Hobart more than 2 months, and 2000 kilometres later.

'It was the perfect day to finish. My destination was Constitution Dock, the final stop of all good Sydney to Hobart voyages. A huge sea lion had come into the dock just before me, entertaining the welcoming party, and what a welcome it was. With so much going on I didn't expect much media coverage, and was happy to slip in quietly, but it certainly didn't turn out that way.

After 79 days at sea, the trip is finally over. I'm not sure how its going to be getting back to normal life, but doing the trip and speaking to hundreds of Tasmanians about the future of their state has made me absolutely certain of the following:
Tasmania is an incredible place, with incredible natural resources. It deserves a government and a vision which will make the most of those resources in the long term.

The proposed pulp mill could never stand up to an independent and public assessment process, and would be an economic and environmental disaster for Tasmania if it proceeds.'

Along the way I met hundreds of people, celebrities, some impressive locals (wildlife) & a incredible coast line. I would like to thank everyone for their support on this trip.

Tasmania's Marine Debris Cleanups

Tasmanian members of Surfrider Foundation have been conducting marine debris clean ups within Tasmania's Southwest World Heritage Area for well over ten years. The last two rubbish clean ups have received national recognition through the Federal Environment Minister's inaugural Environmental Award and the Coco-Cola Community Environment Award. The prize money for these awards has been the source of funding to keep the clean ups continuing.

The project uses local cray fishermen to take teams of volunteers to remote and rarely visited beaches in the heart of the South-west wilderness. The remoteness of the area is important - no rubbish is removed between clean up trips as the only way to get there is by boat or helicopter.

Over the years the fishermen have identified the beaches that collect the most rubbish and their exceptional seamanship enables them to safely land the volunteers on one of the most wild and unforgiving coastlines on the planet. The remoteness also offers the opportunity for some of the best wilderness surfing on the planet, usually only surfed by the cray-fishermen and their deckhands.

The last three trips have been planned around a ten day project window allowing for weather and 2 days travel. Each time we manage to clean 4 to 6 beaches. We systematically clean each beach from end to end and we record each item on specifically designed tally sheets. We note any shorebirds, invasive weeds and unusual or foreign items. Where possible we contact the sources of the rubbish and inform them of the damage they are causing to the wildlife and amenity. We separate out recyclables and re-usable materials and transported them to the recycling depot on the return to port. Weavers and sculptors have first pick of the rest of the rubbish. On the last four trips over 20 tons of rubbish totalling over 30 000 individual items have been collected.

Two or three beaches receive special attention on each trip. These beaches allow for easy access in most weather and usually provide some of the best waves on the trip. These revisited beaches enable us to track trends in the source and type of rubbish that washes up. We have noted a significant decrease in the amount of locally derived fishing rubbish that was traditionally 'deep-sixed' by the fishermen. These items include plastic bait bags and bait box straps, which are responsible for the suffocation and entanglement of many marine mammals including whales, dolphins, seals and turtles.

Places on the clean up are keenly sought, as they are a once in a lifetime opportunity to visit one of the most spectacular and unspoiled Wilderness left on the planet. The Velocity is the mother ship of the clean up fleet Dave Wyatt the skipper has been surfing and fishing on the West coast of Tasmania for 20 years. Dave has been involved in the clean up since 1999 and donates his time and invaluable seafaring and surfing experiences free of charge. Western Australia

Barrow Island

Surfrider Foundation Australia supports the WWF petition against the planned development of a gas plant on remote Barrow Island off the north-west of Western Australia. Economics and the environment come into conflict again as a consortium of the planet's major multinational oil and gas companies plan to build a gas plant on the island nature reserve.

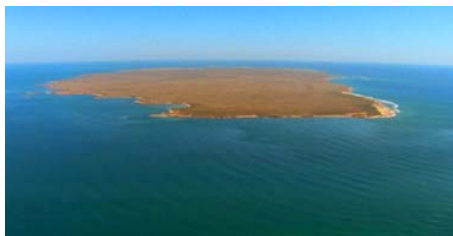
Barrow Island is a "Noah's Ark" for species of rare Australian marsupials that are doomed to extinction due to human impacts on the mainland. Not only will the gas plant infrastructure pose a risk to the island fauna but the surrounding coral reef will need to be dredged for gas tanker ships to collect the processed natural gas.

"We realise that Barrow Island is not a pristine environment and has been an off shore Australian oil field since 1964", concedes Surfrider Foundation Australia Chairman Geoff Withycombe. "However, the minor, in comparison human impact in the last 40 years has been managed so that the island's rare inhabitants and marine life have survived, where in other areas they rapidly have become extinct. The place has been a nature reserve since 1910. We can see that the major infrastructure planned for the gas plant will have a massive impact on this nature reserve."

It may not be a well known surfing area (absolutely no waves there, don't even look at a map), but part of the wealth of our country is our unique coastal and island flora and fauna. Barrow Island's west coast beaches are important nesting sites for green turtles (Chelonia Mydas). On that remote island the burrowing betong and the golden bandicoot need surfers to stand up for them.

Cape Naturaliste Area (South West W.A.)

Proposed Smiths Beach Development - Local groups are awaiting the results of a damaging State Crime and Corruption Committee investigation into alleged web of deceit used by the developer and others to ensure it gets the right people voting for its Development Guide Plan at the Busselton Shire Council. I have attended numerous meetings about this development over the last three years representing local surfers and SFA. The Smiths Beach Action Group are keeping us in the loop and call on us for support when deliberations take place. It would be a brave local councillor who gave this development the go-ahead with its excessive size and environmental impact, following the revelations at the CCC probe!

Please take the time to log onto the Smiths Beach Action Group's comprehensive website at: www.savesmithsbeach.com and register your concern. The latest developer proposal involves a plan for: 2 hotels (100 rooms total); 263 tourist accommodation units; 104 houses; 1,700m² commercial floor space, plus backpacker accommodation. This will monster the hillside and ruin the natural vista currently on show. Registering your concern will allow the Smiths Beach Action Group to contact you to assist in putting in a submission to the Busselton Shire when the imminent Development Guide Plan goes out for public comment soon.

Special Purpose (Surfing) Zones in the Proposed Cape to Cape Marine Park. As a member of the local surfing community and beach rep for SFA, I have been involved, along with Surfing WA, in getting Special Purpose (Surfing) Zones included into the marine park. This comes because of our push to exclude cray fishing operators from dropping their pots and floats too close to important surfing spots, following some very dangerous events over recent years. We have already succeeded, in conjunction with two local board riding clubs and Surfing WA, in getting Fisheries to proclaim regulations within the cray fishing season (15 November to 30 June) which set ten surfing exclusion zones for last season and indefinitely into the future.

We also put together a comprehensive submission to go to the marine park public comment process to support these very same exclusion zones going into the marine park. If successful, surfer safety will be greatly enhanced in our region.

Bunbury

Coastal Enhancement Project, Stages II & III.

Negotiations resulted in more funding and larger machinery for a very effective clean up of the final 50 metre section of rubble affected waterline early in the year. Ten tonnes of rubble was removed in six hours.

Further monitoring throughout the winter, spring and summer indicate the beaches are now cleaner than they were prior to stage II of the project. These efforts also resulted in the opportunity for meaningful input at the preliminary design and planning phase of stage III and important recreational and coastal environmental details were incorporated into the final plan.

Invitation to join the CoastSWaP Committee, August 2006.

Ongoing local lobbying activities and networking resulted in an invitation to join the South West and Peel Coastal Management Committee. This will enable monitoring of future developments impacting on surfing activities, and will be a forum for Surfrider Foundation Australia to table proposals in the future.

Naming of a new beachfront park, December 2006.

A formal proposal was lodged to name a newly landscaped park as 'The Brightspot'. That is the name of the building which was on the site in the 1940's to the 1960's. The proposal was part of a campaign to revive interest in the city's significant surfing and surf life saving heritage. It is hoped this will inspire enthusiasts to become active in future beach care initiatives. Due to the interest already created, it is expected a beach heritage

committee will form to progress several themes such as coastal interpretive pieces and formalising surfing locality names.

Dolphin Behaviour Study.

Careful negotiations will be needed to preserve access to The Cut, a local surf break which is the subject of a major study into human impact on dolphin behaviour. Early indications are that an exclusion zone may be created around the breeding area in Koombana Bay and discussions have already commenced with the research team to ensure surfers are included as stakeholders throughout the process.

Bunbury Looking Ahead Ongoing activities include

- Monitor construction as Stage III of the Coastal Enhancement project commences in 2007. In particular control of contamination of beach zones with rubble, and allowances for safe access to beaches during construction activities.
- Ongoing monitoring of the beaches for rubble exposures.
- Monitor detailed releases of plans for Bunbury Outer Harbour and Turkey Point Redevelopments.

The Killalea Debate so far

'The Farm' is a classic south east facing beach break on the South Coast of New South Wales. It is situated in the Killalea State Park. Today, you can enter the park for free, unlike every other state park in N.S.W where fees are sought. The State Government believes the park has been getting a free run for way to long. Not surprisingly locals were reluctant to pay for the right to surf 'The Farm'. As a result the Killalea State Park Trust looked to tourism to generate profits from the park and make up for the years of free public access. The State Government believes tax payer dollars are not enough to maintain the park. And so began the process of applying to privately develop the Killalea State Park, the first such application ever made. No other state parks in N.S.W have been leased to a private company. Way back in December 2002 the Killalea State Park Trust announced it would look for a partner to develop the park. In February 2003, the trust put the idea on public submission for comment and expressions of interest. Only eight submissions were received. From July 2006 the Minister for Lands, Tony Kelly announced that the park will be the first state park to

have a tourist development built within it. The deal was all but finalised in February 2007.

On the 13th of April the local newspaper reported that the Minister would grant a 52-year lease to Killalea Coastal Investments Pty Ltd for the development of three portions of the park. The multi-million dollar lease was officially granted on the June 30 2006. The development application has yet to be put on public submission. Yes, the lease for construction was approved without consulting the public regarding the scope of the development. We still do not know for sure what will be built. It is expected that the developers will build strata developments on the leased land and sell them to people who buy the strata units. The majority of the community is outraged about the situation. Many people would now rather pay an entry fee than see this development go up.

In the weeks, before the lease was granted a lot of pressure was placed on the State Government to brief the community and the councils of its intentions for the park. The park trust did not reveal anything more than what they had in February 2003.

Now that the lease has been granted, the Killalea State Park Trust will have to put in a development application with Shellharbour City Council. This is expected to be done so in the coming months. Once the DA is received, it will go on public submission for comment.

There are a number of reasons why people are so disgruntled with the development.

- The claim is that the development will pay for the maintenance of the park. Killalea is the only state park with no entry fee. However, it has been confirmed by the Minister himself that the profits from this development will be distributed to parks all across the state via the Public Reserves Management Fund. Therefore, Killalea is essentially being 'used' for profit.
- Construction is expected to include accommodation, restaurants, pools and the like. This will take away from the surfing experience that is 'The Farm'. Although it is situated, adjacent to a very large housing development, The State Park had previously been a sanctuary for 'The Farm'. You currently cannot see any construction from the beach itself. In the park itself, there is only an occasional park bench, a car park and a small demountable. It is a very natural environment. It reminds many people of the Soul Surfer era of the 1960s and 70s with its country setting and distance from commercialised activity.
- Politically, the park is situated in a very safe Labour seat. No matter how upset locals are, the State Government is not threatened with any serious voter backlash.
- As this is a private development, the confidentiality of the leasing process has rendered many people suspicious of how the construction will affect the park.

There is going to be meetings in May and all of the community groups who have involved themselves in discussing this development will be there. I look forward to reporting on this development in the further.

Clean up Australia Day - We picked up over 50 kilos of rubbish on Moana Beach with volunteers.

Planet Arc Tree Day - On our ongoing Surfrider revegetation site - we planted over 500 plants adding to last year's revegetation. We then assisted the Friends of Moana Sands plant another 1000+ plants. All species were colonising species and planted in areas of erosion. We were assisted by Green Corps.

Public access to surf breaks - "I have been researching this issue and have found some very good surf breaks on private property while doing this. I wish I could show you the photos. One location south of Adelaide, the road was redirected and native vegetation cleared. I approached local council about the rare plant association at the end of the new road. They allowed Surfrider Foundation Australia to fence off the area with Council materials, and it is now a public reserve."

Launch of I Surf - I Vote Campaign (from our Media Release)

Politicians of all persuasions were put on notice at the Surfrider Foundation Australia Annual Conference, with the launching of the **I Surf - I Vote** environmental awareness campaign. Members, branches, beach representatives and directors from across the country were represented at the conference, and it was agreed that the message to come out of the conference should be simple and clear - ALL Australians have the right to expect clean water.

Geoff Withycombe, Chair of Surfrider Foundation Australia, said "... all Australians have an affiliation with the coast, whether you live in Alice Springs or on Manly Beach, and the continuing waste of potable waters by dumping in rivers, and creeks and the ocean is not viable. Surfrider Foundation Australia has focused on a catchment approach to water quality, and by launching the **I Surf - I Vote** campaign; we will draw Australia's attention to the position adopted by all political parties to the issues of water quality and access." As Federal and some State elections are happening this year, Surfrider Foundation Australia encourages everyone to consider Australia's waterways and coastal environments before they cast their votes.



By initiating the **I Surf - I Vote** campaign, it was agreed Surfrider Foundation Australia is not being party political, but wanted to raise the issue of coastal degradation and put firmly on the radar the fact that our coast has been neglected for far too long.

The conference also covered the detrimental effects of climate change and global warming on beach amenity, and the ever increasing threat of inappropriate development along the already stressed coastal zone. Surfrider Foundation Australia is determined to raise the profile of water quality and how existing and future environmental challenges will affect not only coastal ecosystems, but also the social fabric of Australia itself.

An integral part of the campaign is a bumper sticker distribution, as well as the distribution of a series of suggested questions which we're encouraging voters to ask of their local political candidates. Surfrider Foundation Australia is a non political organisation and can not endorse or oppose any candidates. Instead, we are encouraging all Australians who have an affiliation with Australia's coasts and beaches to ask questions of their local candidates, with the view of raising the awareness of coastal issues.

Some suggested questions to ask your local political candidates ...

Change these questions to better suit your local area or your concerns.

- What are you doing regarding climate change in your electorate?

- What are you doing about sustainable water management (for example, water conservation, recycling, and reuse)?
- What will you do, or what are you intending to do, about sustainable development (ESD, local character, scale, design) in your electorate?
- In your electorate, what are you doing about protecting and enhancing access to public spaces such as beaches and recreational areas?
- What are you doing to better support local users and community groups (for example, supplying information on commonwealth funding programs, or equipment) in your electorate?
- What are you doing about the protection of iconic coastal assets (for example scenic sites, whales, sea birds, wetlands)?
- What are you doing about beach protection or possible erosion in your area through storm events or natural catastrophes?

The program is aimed at raising general community awareness through a series of presentations (public and target groups), media releases and interpretative signage. The program provides a mechanism for these people to participate in marine conservation activities such as underwater clean ups and biological surveys.

The philosophy of the program is that the only way to make an informed decision on whether it is safe to swim or not on any beach is to have a basic scientific understanding of the way our beaches work. Our beaches are arguably Australia's greatest attractions and recreational resources, and the scientific principles governing them are not difficult, but these principles are not being communicated to the general community. Surfing Reserve in New South Wales

(From the Department of Planning Website) Angourie, on the NSW north coast near Yamba, was declared the first legally protected national surfing crown reserve in NSW in a public ceremony in January. The announcement was made to 400 people gathered at Angourie, which is a popular surfing spot loved by surfers for its breaks and natural beauty.

The surfing community was represented by four-time world surfing champion Dr. Mark Richards, former world champions Mark Occhilupo and Luke Egan, and current world women's masters champion Kathy Steed. Local surfers formed a surfboard guard of honour at the declaration, which included Malibu's, long boards, single fins, twin fins and novelty boards.

Both the land and waters of Angourie are legally protected as a reserve for surfing - the first such reserve in NSW. The Department of Lands worked in partnership with the local community and the National Surfing Reserves Committee to create the reserve under the Crown Lands Act. The dedication of the Angourie surfing reserve is recognition by government of the contribution surfing makes to the Australian lifestyle and of the iconic status of Angourie to the surfing community. Surfrider Foundation looks forward to more nominations around the country.



Economic Value of Recreational Surfing Survey

Surfrider Foundation Australia is working with researchers from the Australian National University and Griffith University to collect benchmark data on the market and non-market value of recreational surfing. The information will be used to advocate for the improvement of surfing amenity for the benefit of both surfers and the natural environment. Kirra Surf Amenity Study

On Tuesday 30 January, researchers from the Griffith Centre for Coastal Management held a public meeting to report on findings from the investigation of community suggested options to improve wave quality - with a specific focus on Kirra.

The range of options that were investigated included:

- Modifications to Big Groyne.
- Supplementary outlet to the north.
- Extend the 'grid system' for dredged sand to be placed further to the north.
- Realign the beach profile at Kirra.
- TRESBP to operate according to current management plans.

As well as these options, a series of models was also undertaken that investigate combinations of options. The Study made 3 recommendations:

- The grid system for dredge spoil locations be extended to the west and the dredge no longer deposit sand in Coolangatta Bay.

- An investigation into the feasibility of constructing a supplementary sand bypass outlet and booster station should be undertaken.
- Kirra Point Groyne needs to be addressed. As part of this investigation, the value of cleaning up the end of the groyne or in time removing the groyne altogether should be considered.

There was a strong agreement on recommendations 1 & 2. The community consensus was that recommendation 3 be modified to specifically call for Big Groyne to be extended to its pre-1996 length (+30m). A fourth recommendation from the community was that Gold Coast City Council commission the Griffith Centre for Coastal Management to continue its investigations. 2006 Annual General Meeting For a full report, please check www.surfrider.org.au Surfrider Foundation Australia's Annual General Meeting was held at Valla Beach, just south of Coffs Harbour. It was a productive gathering, and everyone left with the knowledge 2007 was going to be a great year. The key results areas for 2007 are continuing support for branches and beach representatives, improved membership relations and a focus on grass roots activism and advocacy.

We were honoured to have Victor "Bull" Buchanan; from the Gumbayngirr people give an Indigenous welcome to the delegates. Victor, introduced by Lachie Boddam-Whetham, a long time supporter and coastal advocate, is from twelve generations of indigenous people who have lived in the area.

Bull discussed how Traditional Law associates his people with the sea, and they view the sea as a resource in food gathering and a spiritual place for gatherings. Bull explained that the sea has been handed down from generation to generation right back to Dreamtime, and further, to the beginning of time. Locally he said there are over 15,000 relics from the traditional past. He added that they have much respect for the land.

"We welcome our brothers to the tribal land" he said. He has many in his family clan and they reside in the area. He told us tribes who live on different rivers have different languages, but the culture still exists – it is a subject for local Year Twelve students. The Chair, Geoff Withycombe thanked Bull, and presented him with a small gift as appreciation for his welcome.

The Annual General Meeting was opened by the Chair of the Board of Directors asking ... "Why are we here? And why are we part of Surfrider Foundation?" Feedback included that we share ideals and have a bond to each other and of the course the coast. We celebrate informed concerns whilst laughing in the face of adversity, and sneaking off for a surf when ever possible. The Chair then gave an Official Welcome Address and then moved into the formalities including:

- General Manager's and National Office report
- Directors Reports
- National Branches reports
- Financial report including Auditors Reports

Summary of the Chair's Report

- It is an honour and privilege to oversee another year of growth and 4th term of Chairman.
- Thanks to fellow Directors and Staff (paid and volunteer) at the National Office.
- The Chair noted the focus of 05/06 was to build better branches.
- Significant efforts in communication, support and accountability achieved.
- Proposed continued focus on branches through 2007.
- Several high pressure and stressful incidents over the year, particularly the dissolution of the Gold Coast branch.
- Thanks to Steve Titus for his outstanding and ongoing legal support through this period.

- Confirmation of strong position of Surfrider Foundation Australia brand, logo and reputation.
- Encourage all to promote outcomes in order to maintain Surfrider Foundation Australia important position in coastal advocacy
- Organisation must always consider sustainability, use the structure and be professional.
- Achievements: Tassie Pulp Mill - 50 page submission completed and success made in drawing international support, Cruise Ship Terminal Campaign in association with Save Our Spit Alliance, Surf Aid (where Surfrider Foundation Australia facilitated approx \$700,000 in donations for tsunami relief) and many ongoing issues.
- Hurdles: financial constraints - it was discussed that Surfrider Foundation Australia must not be dependant on the surfing industry.
- Board and Office must prepare a regular and relevant budget
- Administration in the National Office is continually improving
- We need branches and beach representatives to be operating at their full potential
- Some internal and external threats need risk management
- Human resources: Thanks to Stuart Ball, three years of great service as General Manager. New corporate systems being implemented. A period of transition? More support available with better accountants and corporate governance. New Surfrider Foundation Australia HQ, main street of Coolangatta, due to a donation from Queensland Government.
- International: Five international affiliates and four chapters. Expected to soon receive a professional media package from Brazil. The Chair noted Surfrider Foundation Australia's complete confidence in newly appointed International Coordinator, Lia Cobello. USA contributes \$200,000 for operation of international facility.
- Goals for 2007: share, improve, compliance, reduce risk, efficiency and professionalism, reduce administration costs, provide internal accounting to track costs of tasks.
